=== Identifying Mustangs ===

If you were at the April 3rd Meeting of the Central Virginia Mustang Club you should be a near expert on Vehicle Identification Numbers (VIN) and Data Plates. Club Member Bill Jarvis provided a comprehensive explanation of the system.

All Mustangs have this eleven character VIN stamped various places. Some numbers appear on the front fender apron or an aluminum tab attached to the instrument panel on either the passenger or driver's side. The VIN is composed of an alpha-numeric code identifying model year, body series, engine and consecutive unit number.

For additional identification regarding the car's equipment, body type, exterior color, interior trim, manufacture date, district code, axle and transmission, there is a Warranty Plate or Vehicle Certification Label found on the rear face of the driver's side door.

Due to accident replacement, restorations and remanufacture, the plates on doors are often from other Mustangs and neither the plate or label is legal for identification purposes, only the VIN number.

"Make to" sheets are the specification orders to build the car and are frequently found under floor mats or seats or behind dashboards, just anywhere in the interior.

For every serious Mustang collector or if you are considering your very first Mustang purchase, there are reference or decoder books to check out what is supposed to be considered "authentic" according to each and every manufacture year, feature by feature. Bill would be happy to answer any additional questions or direct you to the books mentioned above.

INSURING YOUR CLASSIC CAR

Many people are confused about insuring a Classic Car. We were all pleased to have Jim Doyle and Pat Clayton speak to the Club at the March 6th meeting.

People assume that if you insure your Mustang for a stated amount, this is the amount that you would receive if your car was a total loss. This assumption is not correct in most instances. When you state an amount, this gives the insurance company a guide to determine the price of insurance; you have to prove the Mustangs' value to receive the stated amount.

THE MOST IMPORTANT ITEM TO REMEMBER ABOUT PROVING YOUR CARS WORTH IS:

"KEEP GOOD RECORDS ON MONEY SPENT"

You should have before and after photos, up to date appraisals, current publications that will show the value of cars similar to yours, and anything else that will substantiate your claim. Also, a competent appraiser is a good person to know. You might need their services if you should contest a payment from your insurance company. Also, get to know your insurance agent. They can be a tremendous help to you with their expertise on insurance matters and provide the needed information to properly cover your car.

Gimmick Rallies place the emphasis on FUN with lots of directions on an enjoyable scenic route mixed with various type questions, and could be compared somewhat to a scavenger hunt. Exact accuracy is secondary.

The object of a rally is quite simple. A Rally Master lays out a course over public roads and writes the travel instructions. To win, you simply "interpret" the Rally Master's instructions and duplicate the course in the same number of miles and minutes. Now that does not seem too difficult does it? Scoring is measured by the number of miles or amount of time, over and under, with corresponding penalties, compared to the calibration measure. Any entrant is automatically disqualified for a ticket issued during the rally. All events are to be absolutely safe and for everyone.

L& KING FOR THE "RIGHT" MUSTANG

My enthusiam for Mustangs goes back to 1966 when I was 16 years old and my parents had just bought a new coupe. Over the years I started admiring old Mustangs and reading everything published about them. Eventually I would have to own one. It was last summer that I decided I could afford this pastime and for the last nine months I've been looking for the "RIGHT" Mustang for me.

The search is fun and it keeps changing the more I look. At first I thought I wanted a standard coupe, preferably white with an aqua interior. The more I looked at Mustangs the more I admired different colors, options, body styles and even different model years. This syndrome usually indicates, at some point in the future, acquiring more than one Mustang.

My first inclination was to buy an inexpensive Mustang that needed "a lot of work". I found that even cars needing "a lot of work" weren't cheap; especially considering that I would have to pay someone else to do most of the restoration work. With this in mind, I've decided to invest more in the initial purchase of a Mustang which is pretty much restored or only in need cosmetic work. I'll enjoy my first Mustang more if I can drive it as soon as possible rather than making it a long-term project sitting in my garage as parts.

Mustangs seems to be one of those things in life where a little bit of knowledge can be a dangerous thing – for both the buyer and the seller. At first, thought I might find a truly "naive" owner – one who just wanted to sell a 20 year old car for a few hundred dollars. Well, I certainly don't expect that to happen anymore. It seems many sellers work on the assumption that because of Mustangs' popularity, their average—to—poor—condition, 20—year—old standard Mustang commands collector prices. I have come to realize I will be better off buying a more valuable Mustang from a knowledgeable owner or professional dealer.

My search began by answering ads in the classified section of weeklies like The Trading Post. It's obvious from these ads that there are numerous Mustangs on the market: all conditions and all prices ranges. Some of the nicest Mustangs change hands without ever being advertised. Ive personnally decided on a more direct strategy. Now, whenever I see a Mustang I like, I leave a card with my name and phone number

In the meantime I hope to learn more about Mustangs from the members of this Club. This article seems like a good approach – now over 50 knowledgeable Mustang owners know that I'm still looking to buy my very first Mustang, the "RIGHT" Mustang for me.

MINUTES - CENTRAL YIRGINIA MUSTANG CLUB - MARCH 6, 1985

The regular monthly meeting of the Central Virginia Mustang Club was called to order by Bill Wertz, President on March 6, 1985 at 7:00 P.M. at Universal Ford in Richmond.

The President made announcements regarding yearly membership dues of \$20.00 in the National Mustang Club and distributed applications, along with copies of the National Mustang Magazine, which members of that club receive. He also announced that Bob Leipertz, Treasurer, would be accepting payments for dues in the Central Virginia Mustang Club of \$10.00 per year, which would cover husband and wife.

The President distributed a fact sheet to be filled out by those present and announced door prizes would be given out later in the evening.

There was considerable discussion as to what year models this Club would recognize and it was decided by a hand vote of those persons present that models '641/2 through '85 would be considered, and would be divided into appropriate classifications, i.e. '641/2 through '73, etc..

The Treasurer, Bob Leipertz, reported the Club's membership, to date, totaled 56, with \$100.00 in the treasury. The Treasurer also distributed receipts for dues collected at the previous meeting.

The President indicated the Board of Directors had met and discussed possible show dates for this Club -- September 7 or 14, 1985. It was agreed since the Richmond NASCA would be held on September fourteenth, September seventh would be set as the date for the show and the vote was unanimous.

There was considerable discussion regarding the type judging desired for the Club and it was agreed the Club would attempt to get a qualified test from the National Mustang Board. Bill Jarvis and Carroll Lipscombe were appointed Co-chairmen fo the Judging Committee. As point of information, the President noted there is a standard test which is sent to the National Board for grading.

There was discussion regarding what type rules would be best for this Club to operate under — strict as opposed to a more casual type, and it was agreed by a hand vote of the membership that the rules would be casual since the concensus was few automobiles would qualify for a national show. It was pointed out it is imperative to be very clear on what is to be judged and the President suggested the Judging Committee should come back with suggestions. Pat Clayton and Jim Doyle, both insurance agents and members of this Club gave a very enlightening presentation on types of insurance available for classic automobiles — how to select policies and maintain them up—to—date, and especially stressed documentation. Information was also presented on availability of limited mileage policies and the

The preparation of a newsletter was discussed and the President asked five people willing to serve on that to remain after the meeting and suggested anyone wishing to buy, sell or trade, to place ads in the newsletter.

The President suggested anyone who has any suggestion for inclusion in the Bylaws should contact Bill Thompson, Chairman.

The President also asked owners of stores to consider giving discounts to members of this Club holding membership cards.

The President also suggested that any rallies, technical seminars, etc., should be broad enough so everyone could participate and enjoy them.

Door prizes were given out and the President announced the next monthly meeting of the Club would be Wednesday, April 3, 1985, at 7:00 P.M., at Universal Ford.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:15 P.M.
