

#### Carlisle

How many times have you heard the word Carlisle floating around? You may have been asked at the last meeting if you were "going to Carlisle". Is Carlisle a person. place or thing? Carlisle is a living breathing event in Pennsylvania - three times a year. Its official name is Carlisle Collector Car Flea Market and Corral. Sounds like your every day comeon type junk corner right. Wrong. Its 7500 vendors covering 82 acres of nothing but cars, parts, memoriabilia, toys, literature and automotive items. Picture a place the size of the Richmond Fairgrounds, all the parking lots, and race tracks covered with vendors then multiply it by three. It takes about 5 hours to drive to the community of Carlisle from Richmond. Once you arrive finding a place to stay is your first big challenge. Hotels and motels are booked from year to year and your best bet is to check about 40-50 miles outside Carlisle. If your lucky enough to have a motor home, camper or van you might find a parking place on the street within a mile of a gate. The second biggest challege is to cover all the vendor spaces without passing out. By walking from 8 AM to 7 PM for three solid days, its possible to see it all. Third challenge - how to carry all the treasures you buy back to your vehicle and pay for the doctor bills to cure your pulled musles, back ache, bruised hips and cut fingers. But the biggest challenge of all is to stay dry. It never fails to sprinkle, drizzle or downpour the weekend of Carlisle. You know youv'e been to Carlisle when you take a big step over a puddle, your boot comes off and your bare foot sinks down into 5 inches of MUD. The next big Carlisle event is Spring Carlisle '87, April 30-May 3. It's one of the most adventurous, fun and exhausting weekends you'll ever spend.

## Club Display

Now that the summer shows are over, indoor car shows are being scheduled. These shows are usually put on by a promoter that travels from city to city and encourages the "locals" to show their cars, along with area car clubs. #### BOSS REVIVED by Terry Wagner

Wondering about what happened to the BOSS 320 that expired enroute to the Dick Strauss' Grand Opening April 11, 1986? Well, have I got a story of woe for you. The head broke off of the exhaust valve in #3 cylinder. That wasn't too bad until it stood on end which caused the piston to break, which in turn allowed the connecting rod to flail around a bit til lodging itself at the base of the cylinder causing the rod to bend into a letter "S". And at that point all motion ceased.

So much for how and what happened. Locating everything needed for repair was an experience. Spring Carlisle just happened to be the following week. I was able to locate a well used BOSS302 block. I found someone locally with a set of heads. I got to be on a first name basis with the parts man at the nearby Ford dealership for the little pieces.

On a high recommendation of another Club member, Tony Mangrum got the job to reassembe the engine. The block made a trip to the first machine shop to be cleaned up and spec'ed. They recommended boring, only to find out that one of the cylinders didn't clean up. Another machine shop did a fine job sleeving the cylinder.

Now Tony put the bottom end together and sent it off to a machine shop for balancing. The heads go off to have the valves ground and fit. Tony assembled the valve assembly, shimmed the springs and carefully inspected each piece as it went back into the engine. The heads were ready to go on along with the other small parts, water pump, intake carburator, etc.

The engine was ready for pickup around 10 o'clock, Thursday night - 48 hours before our "Classic Car Cavalcade". With help from Kenny Fischer and Mike Timms, the engine finally slipped in at 2 AM Friday morning. All day Friday was spent connecting the cooling, exhaust and electrical systems, but alas due to an igniting problem, did not finish in time for the show.

Monday night (after resting all day Sunday), all the problems got squared away. Tuesday the car went back to Tony for the final tune on the engine. We were able to drive the car to Waynesboro for their show Sept. 13th.

My experience comes down to: an engine block is not an engine block till it has been machined, assembled and proven. Three and four dollar parts get expensive when you buy 32 of them. And if you are looking for someone who can fix your automatic transmission, carburator problems, or rebuild an engine... or just put a damn good tune-up on your engine, I don't think you will find a better mechanic than Tony Mangrum at Tony's Auto Repair at 5255-F Hull Street Rd. (232-6760). If anybody can sort out a problem with your car it is Tony!

October 4th, the Club has been invited to participate in a parade at Victoria, Virginia, 16 past Crewe see Carroll Lipscombe if your able to participate. Official crusie night will be the following Saturday October 4th. BREAK Candidates for officers and board will appear in the next newsletter. 
