

A FINE SHINE



As good alternative to an expensive paint job, when you have more energy and time than money, you might want to consider Meguiar Products.

At the last CVMC meeting Monte Evans demonstrated some of these fine products and submitted this article to review the steps covered to revive old faded paint.

First, wash the car thoroughly. Before going on allow the car to dry completely. When the car is dry begin step two. Wipe the finish down with enamel reducer or varsol solvent. Do not allow a solvent soaked rag to lay on the paint or it will remove too much paint permanently. This wipe down process will remove dead pigments, road tar, tree sap, etc.

For the third step you'll need a circular buffer and some Meguiar's Mirrow Glaze #3 Machine Glaze. Cover the entire car. Be careful not to linger on any high spots, corners etc. or you may burn the paint.

Follow with step four by buffing the finish with a new clean pad to remove leftover cleaner. Step five will require a little elbow grease applying Mirrow Glaze #7 Sealer and Reseal Glaze. Do one area at a time. Do not overapply sealer or it will be hard to remove. Use a soft cloth changing frequently. Terri towels work great. This step will remove all buffing circles. Finally apply your favorite hard paste wax or one of Meguiars final step waxes to seal in a

beautiful finish.

After all this time, spend a little extra time removing wax residue from cracks, chrome pieces, letters and other places it will gather for a professional finished FINE SHINE!

HISTORY OF THE CENTRAL VIRGINIA MUSTANG CLUB

Would you believe the Central Virginia Mustang Club is over four years old?

Long about the middle of 1982, several people in Richmond began thinking about putting together an organization for people interested in Mustangs. It was not an immediate undertaking. Bill Wertz along with Jim Munsie, David Frank and Jim Doyle contacted Mustang Club of America for charter information which included a roster of local MCA members. The people that were already individual members of MCA from the area were contacted and asked to call others who might be interested in attending meeting of a local Mustang chapter. A charter was granted Dec. 14, 1982 by The Mustang Club of America to officially form the Central Virginia Mustang Club.

Each day Bill stopped to chat with fellow mustangers. One was named Major Wood of the City's Police Dept. He in turn contributed the name of Bill Thompson. This network of collecting names and numbers had been going on for years. A few preliminary meeting were held at Pat Clayton's home and Sharon Frank contributed her time to do the much needed secretarial work.

Finally, Bill decided to place an ad in the Richmond Times-Dispatch for anyone interested to

meet at a steak house on Nine Mile Road on a selected Wednesday in Jan. 1985. He expected 10 to 15 new people to take the time out to attend, but ended up with a bulging room with 55-60 attendees.

Bill Wertz was overwhelmed at the response this little ad generated. Even though many people showed, no one wanted to be an officer. Mr. Wertz accepted the Presidency on a temporary basis with Nancy Bell as Secretary and Bob Leipertz as Treasurer. It was agreed to meet again at this steak house the first Wednesday of February '85.

You could tell right off that this was no ordinary Club. Everyone was enthusiastic and contributed their opinions and ideas freely. The March meeting was held at Universal Ford and the first car show plans began developing with Bill Jarvis and Carroll Lipscombe as Co-Chairmen. When Bill Wertz asked for volunteers for the newsletter, Tina Fritz offered her computer skills. Bill Thompson agreed to customize the By-Laws outline.

At the April '85 meeting the ByLaws were officially adopted. About this time Bill explained that he would not be available to continue as President due to professional commitments and a personal interest in his father's restoration business and selling parts.

The officers elected were: President Terry Wagner,

Vice-Pres. Billie Jarvis, Secretary Nancy Bell, Treasurer Bob Leipert and National Director Kent Callahan. The Directors were: Carroll Lipscombe, Bill Jarvis, Tina Fritz and Scott Gresham.

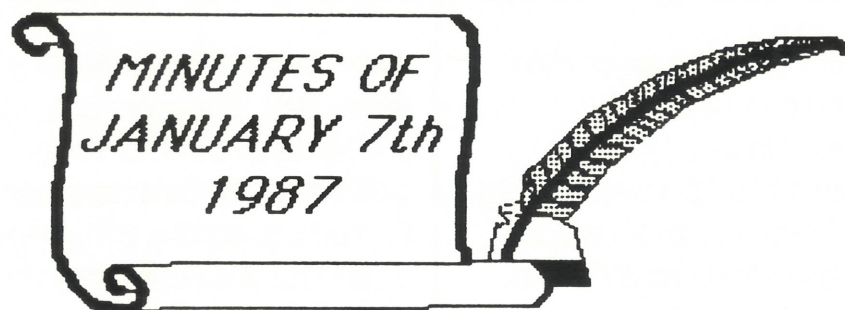
Program speakers began at the March '85 meeting with Jim Doyle and Pat Clayton discussing insurance and your Classic Automobile. After that programs included Bill Jarvis explaining how to ID a Mustang by the manufacturing codes, Terry Wagner about rallying, Kenny Fischer about auto painting, Kent Callahan with a restoration vide and to finish up 1985's programs Al Azzarone's slides of the first car show exhibition.

The events of 1985 included a Spring Gimmick Rally in May, Picnics in June and August at Overhill Lake, Car Show Exhibit in September, the first Club Display in November at the Rod and Custom Car Show at the Fairgrounds and of course cruised Bill's BBQ regularly.

The first publication of the Club newsletter "The Galloping Gazette" began in May of 1985. The format remains pretty much the same with the President's Message, reports on program speakers, upcoming events, classifieds and minutes. Some special items were published regarding performance Mustangs, personal interest, hydroplaning, mustang decanters, and birthdays.

The two most memorable events of 1985 were Club jackets

The regular monthly meeting of the Central Virginia Mustang Club was called to order Wednesday January 7, 1987 by President Terry Wagner at Richmond Ford, 4600 W. Broad Street.

The Treasurer's report was given by Bob Liepertz. Bob handed out the treasurer's report for the year 1985/6. In addition, 166 current members as of January 1 with a balance of \$1,453.92 was stated that since the creation of the Club 48 members have not renewed their membership.

Tina Fritz brought to the floor for discussion whether the minutes of the prior meeting should be read at each meeting. A motion was made by Tina to vote that the minutes should be read at each meeting. The motion was seconded by Billy Jarvis. First vote, 23 nay/23 yea. A second vote was taken: 23 nay/22 yea. The motion was not carried.

The budget committee report was given by Charlie Culley, Chairman. Charlie advised the members that the purpose of the committee was to review expenses and income, to set a budget and look into the raising of Club dues. It was stated that the committee had come up with several recommendations to present to the Board of Directors for consideration. The recommendation were (in brief): That a resolution be adopted to maintain a balance in the checking account to cover Club expenses; That an interest bearing account be investigated; That dues increase to \$18 per year; That dues be billed annually beginning January 1, 1988 with a prorated schedule until that time; That changes be made to the publication of the newsletter.

The President then opened the floor for discussion on the recommendations so the Board of Directors could get a feel for the views of the membership.

It was suggested to hold down printing costs a copier should be purchased by the Club. There was discussion concerning cost of maintenance, where to store the copier and the time involved versus printing costs. Tina advised that a change in printers had brought the cost from \$200 to \$95. Tina also noted it took 10 hours to produce a newsletter and 3 to 4 hours to prepare it for mailing once it returned from the printer. A tentative distribution committee was formed with members Carolyn Timms, Llew Stakes, Eric Selph, Darrel Andres and Mike Walker serving as Chairman. Anyone else interested in helping with distribution should contact Mike.

Several changes in the newsletter were discussed. The Club discussed changing from monthly newsletters to monthly bulletins with quarterly newsletters. Several other options were discussed.

A discussion on raising dues followed. Several members thought raising dues to \$18 would cause loss of members. Some members felt that raising dues and "decreasing" newsletters would cause loss of members. It was stated by the budget committee that the intention to change the publication of the newsletter was to "cut out" duplicate information.

Bill Broughton advised that he had nothing new on a meeting place. Tina Fritz stated she had contacted several rescue squads, malls, community centers, museums and that she had no favorable response at this time to report.

Tina Fritz was asked about the status of our non-profit report to the IRS.

She stated that it would be reviewed and mailed by next meeting.

BREAK! Awards followed and were given to members for outstanding dedicated service. The members receiving plaques were: Leroy Lilly, Carroll Lipscombe, Pat Clayton, Terri Herndon, Bob Leipertz, Tina Fritz, Kenny & Nellie Fischer, Kent & Connie Callahan, Bill & William Jarvis and Monte & Judy Evans.

Committee Chairman were re-appointed. Most chairman accepted another year's term. (Committee Chairman are listed in the officers list of this newsletter.)

A suggestion was made by a member that a portion of each meeting should be set aside for advice or for a parts exchange. A suggestion of a bulletin board at each meeting was made.

Tina Fritz informed the Club that member Betty Wilson's husband had passed away suddenly. It was agreed that the Club would send a sympathy card.

Four new members including Mike Martin, Kevin Murray, Darrin Johnson and Robert Gross were welcomed to the Club with a warm round of applause.

The raffle was won by Kenny Fischer and Walter Harley.

Monte Evans was the speaker. He demonstrated cleaning and polishing of painted surfaces. (Details described in this issue's article "Fine Shine".)

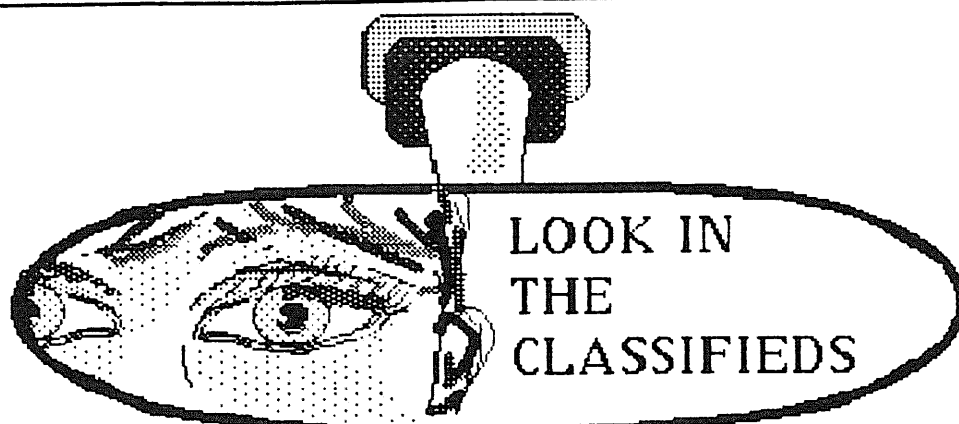
It was announced that the next meeting speaker would be a representative from the Goodyear Tire Company. A video will be shown with a question & answer period.

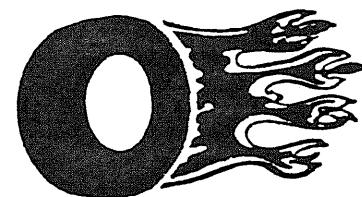
