NOT FOR LADIES ONLY

Lyn St. James is a lovely young lady that drives Ford GTP (Grand Touring Prototype) race cars in the IMSA (International Motor Sport Association) race circuit. She was a guest on the Gary Collins' Hour Magazine show April 28th with some very

basic, but important information.

One of the things she stressed was for every driver to carry a small tool box in the car. You very well may have a great collection of tools in the garage or take your car for maintenance at the local mechanic's shop but that certainly won't help if you're stuck somewhere. A flashlight was her first suggestion along with an adjustable wrench, flat and phillips screwdrivers, tire gauge, duct tape, flares, fix-a-flat and a rag or two. Other helpful items include jumper cables and adjustable hose clamps. Belts are another item that can break. Older cars have several belts while on newer cars have only one belt. It takes some doing to replace a belt but it can save a good deal of towing, time and money if you have the correct one in the trunk. Even if you don't know how to use all these things, the person who kindly stops to assist you may be able to use them. The other subject Ms. St. James addressed was automotive fluids and their importance. BRAKE FLUID: Is found in a reservoir called a master cylinder, usually located infront of the steering column on the driver's side of the carand has a cap. On older cars the brake fluid reservoir is metal and the cap may be silver in color. On newer cars, the reservoir is a plastic container. It should be filled within a quarter inch of the top of the reservoir. It can be filled whenever the car is hot (after driving it) or cold (before driving) but should be kept full. Any change should be noted to your mechanic. ENGINE OIL: Is usually checked by pulling out the dipstick. The dipstick usually has a curl on the end so you can loop your finger thru it and pull it out of its tube located toward the front of the engine (one side or the other). It's usually between 18-24 inches long with indications on the end telling you whether it's full or needs oil. It's important to add oil only when it is actually below the add oil mark. Oil is also to be changed regularly every 2-3,000 miles along with the filter located underneath the engine. Normal usage is one quart per 1,000 miles, any more is excessive and should be questioned. TRANSMISSION FLUID: This can only be checked on Automatic Transmission cars and can be found toward the rear of the engine compartment. This fluid should be checked when the engine is hot and kept at the level indicated on the dipstick. There's no external method to check transmission fluid on Standard Transmission cars.

POWER STEERING: If your car has power steering the fluid should be checked when the car is hot. Look toward the front of the engine (either side) for a cap. When it's removed the dip stick will be built into the cap. ATF (automatic transmission fluid) is used here.

COOLANT: This refers to the combination of water and anti-freeze kept in the radiator. On older cars the fluids are poured directly into the radiator. On newer cars there is an overflow reservoir that indicates the proper level of fluids when the car is hot or cold. The proper combination of fluids can be checked with a tester that looks a lot like a turkey baster with a squeezable bulb on the end and a gauge to indicate the proper mixture. Prior to cold weather definitely check your coolant. During the summer months check it semi-monthly.

The other things discussed were batteries and tires. Batteries are very important and usually ignored. The older batteries must be filled by first removing their caps. It is preferred to use distilled water (without chemicals) when filling each cell. Weekly is not too often to check older batteries.Many of the newer batteries are maintenance free and requires no filling. The tire guage mentioned in the tool box is used for keeping the correct pressure in your tires. Tire pressure is measured in PSI (pounds per square inch). If you don't know how much is enough, read the rating on the tire or look in your owner's manual. Some of the newer cars even print the information in the glove box or on the edge of the doors.

You may think that it's too much hassel or too involved to become technically competant about auto maintenance. Just think about how much you depend on your vehicle. Many of us jump on a highway and go hundreds of miles without ever opening anything but the driver's door. Remember extreme cold or extreme heat is hard on your car. It is best to be prepared - check all maintenance items regularly and keep a few tools handy. With so many "self-serve" gas stations, many of these items get ignored. Take some time, crawl under your hood and get familiar with your engine compartment.

Owen Ford in Jarrett, VA was host to a car show on May 14th. A few club members attended; Carroll Lipscombe, Monte Evans, Mike Timms, and Larry Strum. The judging was "Driver's Choice", and none of the CVMC members won a trophy! Can you believe that?

Part III: Setting Value for the Car in Richmond

The most accurate way to determine value on a particular car is to find that person who owns that particular car. Every person has a basic idea of what his car is worth. The more sources you use to help you determine value, the better off you will be. In other words talk to as many people as you can. The Club has several members who are knowledgeable on their car.

Another excellent source is THE MUSTANG BLACK BOOK. This book is an excellent source for setting prices and reflects a slightly higher value than cars bring locally. It is very simple to determine value if you can see the condition of the car. See previous issue of Rick's Tips for help there.


When I have looked for prices I have used National Publications to help know what range to look for on a car. My favorite publication is HEMMINGS MOTOR NEWS.

MUSTANG MONTHLY is a fair source. The FORD BUYER'S GUIDE has more cars for sale than MUSTANG MONTHLY. Local publications such as THE TRADING POST, TRADING TIMES, and THE RICHMOND NEWSPAPERS are good but do not have many rare cars for sale such as the Shelbys, Bosses, and other exotic Fords.

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
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Minutes of the Central Virginia Mustang Club meeting held at Richmond Ford on May 4, 1988.
