# FOURTH ANNUAL CLASSIC CAR CAVALCADE

Another car show will enter the archive scrapbook pages for the Central Virginia Mustang Club. Saturday, August 13th was the fourth show organized and presented in the Richmond area. Each show has its own distinctive pizzazz and characteristics.

The Club's first show 1985 was sheld on the Broad Street parking lot of Richmond Ford. The day was dreadfully hot with the temperature nearing the one hundred degree mark hut we drew in several hundred people. This first show was a non-judging show with popular vote being the rule of the day. We had a few door prizes, sold some refreshments, and encouraged people to ioin the Club. That show sparked the interest of manv members to have an annual show, expand it to include judging and become our major Chub supporting money making event of the year. When it was all over that day, we had increased the membership of the Club by approximately 25% and sunburns by 100%.

The enthusiasm for putting on a show the next summer could not be contained. Plans were started early and lots of people spread the word. The show would be held in September to avoid the heat. Little did we know that September is very warm but also wet. still The show was held Saturday, September 6, 1986, expanded to provide judging and just plain more of everything. The day started off rather cloudy which kept some of the cars home. That didn't stop all the fun, excitement and hard work that went into a very successful show.

year The following on weekend of September 12, 1987, the weather reports were calling for thunder showers. Each year volunteers meet on Friday night before the show to begin preparations and spend the night. For those who bring their cars on Friday night, the Club makes sure the parking lot is secure and to be ready for the early This birds Saturday morning. The vear was no exception. tarps went up, the motor home was in place, the signs were posted and tables arranged. The only thing not planned on was a storm. For a little excitement, lightening struck the nearby AJD building bringing out the fire trucks. Most everything ended up being soaked. Saturday morning was pretty but scattered clouds. As the day progressed, people poured in to view the cars keeping one eye on the sky. Around three o'clock, it became a race to finish judging and present trophies before nature showered our tired hot bodies. We lost. Trophies were awarded with soggy handshakes and everyone scattered for cars and cover. For an hour and a half it poured...hard. The crew did not abandon ship however, everyone stayed for clean up and went out for a cruise at Bill's BBQ afterward.

In 1988, over two thousand spectators passed through gates to enjoy one of the nicest, most diverse selections of cars assembled for a CVMC show. Fifty-nine owners (24 of which were Club members) registered 66 Mustangs to be judged. Over 40 cars in other categories were on display from other Clubs, the special interest divisions and two "display only" Mustangs. Nine more cars were encircled in our car corral for sale while 19 vendors displayed wares in 25 vendor spaces.

New fond memories will be logged along with lots of very

hard work. The weekend of the show involves eighteen hours, only a portion of the time that goes into the months of preparation and meetings before the show. Fifteen volunteers head committees to handle various aspects of the show. Ap. proximately nine months before the next show Kenny Fischer, Show Chairman, holds a plan ning meeting to outline and dis-Once the date cuss strategy. and place for the show is set. Tina Fritz begins sending out press releases and letters requesting support for the show, revises forms and prepares for numerous mailings. Our Sponsors Chairman, Holly Womack, then asks everyone to start lining up merchants to donate door prizes for the show plus collects the advertisements to appear in the program. Closer to the show, about six weeks or so, Monte Evans, Registration Chair man, begins to receive money and registration forms.

During these several months other meetings are being held. Carroll Lipscombe gathered together those who would be judging and carefully reviewed and revised the judging sheets. So everyone would have cold drinks and a hot lunch, Darrell Andrews, Concession Chairman, made numerous calls and watched all the ads to get the best buys on supplies. also arranged for an ice donation from Rueger's. Facilities Chairman, Terry Wagner made sure there would be a public address system, restrooms, trash boxes, tables, etc. the day of the show along with a beautiful air conditioned mobile home, compliments Creek Recreational of Falling Of course, the one Vehicles. thing everyone can't wait to see are the awards. Kenny Fischer and Mike Timms took care of arranging for all the trophies making several trips to Fredericksburg.

And then there's the day of the show jobs. These are the people who have attended the meetings but couldn't really pre-arrange anything. New this year, the Club asked for the donations at the gate for the Freedom House. Jim Gladson. Admissions Chairman, played-it-byear, nabbed a couple of volunteers to help him and did a great job collecting donations and making sure programs were handed out. Once the PA was hooked up, Pat Clayton began the day long job of thanking everyone for attending the show, giving credit to all the sponsors. our 30 program advertisers and donated door prizes and contributions from members. As Holly drew door prize numbers, Pat would make sure winners had plenty of notice and time to claim their prizes.

Nellie Fischer was one of the busiest members at the show handling sales of raffle tickets, merchandise, Club memberships and Nellie's creative concessions. talents always come in handy for making signs and making sure things are displayed pleasingly. Several times throughout the day, you could hear calls for Treasurer, Barbara Evans. Our money lady made sure everyone had change when they needed it, then collected and kept track of all the various sources of in-Later she prepares the show budget report. Charter member, vendor and ardent supporter of the Club, Bill Jarvis once again took time to handle placing vendors. Bill was out Friday night marking off spaces and back early, early Saturday morning to greet vendors and get them settled.

Once the show is underway, the concession gets fired up for hotdogs, the PA begins to sing, tickets go on sale, the registrants begin streaming in around 7


a.m. and the spectators around 9 a.m. As the cars get grouped by years and styles, the judges begin their inspection. There is one more Chairman and committo begin their important duties. The Scoring is headed by Carolyn Timms and Donna This is a real pressure Seay. job to total, check and recheck all the judging sheets and organize the information to determine the show winners.

Most of these dedicated commitheads have Mustangs that entered in the show. About all they get to do is drive the car in place, take a few quick swipes at cleaning and get to the real work of the show. Monte and Judy Evans were stationed at Registration from 7 a.m. until way after noon to make sure everything was straight. Jim Glad. son, Al Azzarone, Tom Victory, and Jay Clayton shared gate duty all day long. The concession area was really busy transferring drinks into iced tubs and making sure all the customers were taken care of. Darrell Andrews, Doug Trammell, Nellie Fischer, Nellie's Mom, Al Azzarone. Barbara Evans and others shared concession duty. public address system ended up a family affair with Pat Clayton handling most of the announcing and his son Jay doing relief.

Many of the Club members participated in judging the various classes. Some judges worked all day, others only did specialty judging on single classes. All of the judging efforts were appreciated. Thank you Carroll Lipscombe, Bill Thompson, Sonny Coble, Mike Timms, Carl Evans, Michael Walker, Rick Nochta, David Lythgoe, Bob Anderson, Larry Strum, Terry Wagner and Bill Jarvis.

What a success. Not just the show, but the Club in general. Many of the Charter members are still regularly involved with Club activities and

always happy to see a new face and willing to share Club duties. When the day of the Car show finally arrives. everyone pulls together and does whatever job needs to be done. Many people have served more than one or two committees. Several Chairmen have handled their own committee served on other committees as Many members simply show up the day of the show and help wherever hands are Each CVMC member should be proud of the efforts at the show. The Club will be donating \$750 in cash the collected donations to Freedom House in addition to supplementing the Club's treasure with approximately the amount plus. If your name was missed, it was not intention-If this sounds like something that you would enjoy, join in for the planning sessions for next year's show. Kenny is already talking about the Fifth Annual Classic Car Cavalcade for 1989!
