A Look In The Rearview Mirror at Bill Jarvis...and Billie.

You can't interview Bill without including Billie for she has been riding shotgun on this road trip for 56 years!

How did your passion for cars develop? "My passion for cars started back when I was 15 –16. First car was a 39 Ford Coupe and it when on from there with different types of vehicles. I had Plymouths,

Oldsmobile's, Dodge's and Chrysler's but I've always been partial to Fords."

"I tried to drag race for a while but with a wife and 3 kids there wasn't a whole lot of money for the 33 Ford. Now I learned a big lesson one time I tried to borrow some money to race. The first time out, blew the engine up, that curtailed the racing for a while. That was back in the late 50s, early 60s. That was the end of my drag racing. I got into Go-Karts, raced Go-Karts for 20 yrs. We ended up building and running a track over in Hanover. Billie has been with me through many episodes, ups and downs, different things that came into my mind."

What's your best car related memory? There were 2 in regards to the Mustang.

"We put 3 of our cars in a show in Richmond. The way they would judge those cars, all 3 were in the same class. There was a good field of cars and we took 1st, 2nd & 3rd."

Billie picked up the trophies but Bill didn't like that because they put all cars in the 64 –73, Chevrolets, Dodges, whatever. That didn't sit well but he didn't make the rules.

"We used to go around to a lot of shows in the early 80s. DC was a big Mustang show. We went up there. After they'd judged my car and had the trophies up, they told me that we'd tied for first. Anyone who's competitive knows there ain't no way you tie for first."

He always tried to get the judging sheet to try to correct things, so he went home, got this one, the ones from subsequent shows and was changing stuff from one show to the next. When they went back up in 83, they went into the BOSS class and took Best in Show with 150 cars.

Do you prefer souped up or classic? "Like to keep them pretty close to stock."

When did you see your first Mustang and how did it make you feel? "Friend of mine used to fly out at the airport. He was a salesman, and he came in there with a new 65 Fastback. Four of us got in it, he wanted to take us out show us what it was like. And all of us were in the 200 lbs and up range and when I got out of the back seat, I knew I didn't want a Mustang. It would be a good toy but not for a family. And we had 3 kids at the time."

What do you think about the resurgence of the muscle car and do you think the new models support or hurt the legacy? I like them. I was real wound up about a GT500 when they first came out but

they played games with the prices and I don't need anything that bad. I won't live long enough to see them be worth what they are getting for them now. So I'm not worried too much about them unless something comes along."

"I do like the idea of the 2011 Mustang having a 5.0 particularly with the HP they have, and with a lot of the muscle cars you've got to get a straight shift. The old 4 speed is one thing but a 6 speed at my age is too damn many gears. That's why I've got 2 Lightning Pick-ups--fast and they are automatics."

Tell us about CVMC's beginnings. How did the club come about? "Several of us around town, Carroll Lipscombe, David Lythgoe, Glen Lane, several of us that had cars or were going around to some car shows like Washington, Norfolk, VA Beach, Winchester, Roanoke, Lynchburg. They were all right here within 100 miles. That was the early 80s."

He and William talked about how there ought to be a Mustang club, they'd already been going around with all these cars, going to Carlisle, Charlotte, different shows, swap meets, shopping, looking for stuff for our cars. He knew some people with MCA down in GA, and in talking with the local bunch, several of them agreed there ought to be a club,

"And there was word that there were 4 guys in Southside, Bill Wertz was one but I don't remember the other 3. Anyhow I called them and talked to them and they said yeah they were working on it and were gonna try to have an organizational meeting that winter of 85. The first organizational meeting was advertised in the paper and was held on 9 Mile Rd in a restaurant right across from East Gate Mall, a Bonanza or something. We just told everybody we knew and we were all down there for that. Once or twice there, and then Carroll got us up into Universal Ford for a few months. Elected officers, I had been on the Board of Directors for several years. Didn't hold an office but my wife was Secretary a couple of times."

"In the beginning everybody was just trying to get things started and when people are eager to get things going it seems to work out. Like every other club people have their differences, everyone has an idea. First big car show was at AJD Hat Factory on Petersburg Turnpike."

"We first had a display at Richmond Ford but that wasn't an actual car show. It drew a lot of Mustangs; we had the whole front line." As a whole, he thought a lot of people in the club worked together well and agreed.

"But like every other club you get a little bickering here and there. That show down on the Pike was a big show, had a bunch of cars, Billie worked concession stand, people did what needed to be done." They had cars, parts, the family helping out, the grandson in the playpen. "It was like a circus. We used to recruit people to drive the cars there--other than the BOSS, I didn't let anyone drive that. But we were a lot younger then and had lots more energy. Terry took the car, Donny took the Ranchero full of parts, I drove the BOSS. We went back and got the kids. Made trips back and forth, got another car, we looked like Sanford and Son with the Ranchero loaded with parts. Before we got the truck, we took 2 Rancheros full of parts. One of Rancheros had been a Henrico County Dog Catcher's car."

Is there anything the club stopped doing over the years that you miss? "Probably wouldn't do now, but we went on a couple of timed road rallies. I'd never been in one before, never even thought about it but got into 2 that the club had and enjoyed it. Didn't get totally lost either. Went on scavenger hunt, were all over city of Richmond. We did on Mother's Day and didn't have the expected crowd."

"What I liked about earlier meetings, we tried to get people to have a 15 –20 minute talk or session on their expertise: body man, painter, insurance, and we tried to get club members to do it. I did it several times. A lot of talent in the club, you just gotta find it. And I know not long

ago I sat in a meeting at a table with a young man and he's into newer cars. He was talking about how he was modifying it. I'm not into that but I was trying to listen to him to learn what he was doing. A lot of talent in the club and people; some know about earlier models some about the new and if you can get them to do it, you can get some information from them.

Tell us about the Mustangs you've owned over the years and what's in your garage now? "The first Mustang in the family was in Jan 74, oldest boy wanted a 67-68 Fastback. I went on a search for several months and ended up buying one, bought it from the original owners, a GTA. I didn't even know what a GTA stood for. I had to start doing research on the cars, but it was in excellent shape and very reasonable at the time. After I researched the car a little bit, I told him 'I don't think this car is going to leave the family so when you're through with it, I'll buy it back from you'. I tried to convince him not to take it to Tech when he went to school. I said it's going to deteriorate, and anyhow it did and he decided after a couple of years, he said 'You're right, I shouldn't have brought it up here, I'll sell it to you.' I had to pay more for it than I originally paid for it."

And that was his first Mustang purchase--buying it and then buying it back in the late 70s. His daughter drove it to school, then in her senior year, bought her a 72 Mach I. "Then about 80, I put the 67 in the garage, jacked it up and started working on it. I was going restore it somewhat. Not make a new one out of it, spruce it up. I started working on that."

"Midway through that car, one thing leads to another, you get interested in all kinds of Mustangs. I had the idea that I wanted a BOSS. I ran across one and I bought that. Sidelined the 67, put all the parts in and under it. And put the BOSS on the other side of the garage as it was closer to being done to suit me, it was drivable and painted when I got it. And it's gone crazy since then. On thing in regards to the Mustangs, I have some

later models, I lean towards the old cars because I know a little more about them. And I lean more towards leaving them pretty close to stock. Billie and I had the idea that it would be nice if we could have all 3 BOSS cars: 302,351,429 and in the 80s that worked out for me."

"I had 2 BOSS 429s at one time. I had a 70 with no engine and all. It had a Cleveland automatic. Kid went to school with my children, brought it by one day, and said he had to take it to Richmond Ford to verify it for the insurance company; it didn't have the correct engine in it. He started talking; I said 'is that thing supposed to be a 429?' My brother in law and I were both sitting in the back and we didn't say any more to him. We both left him sitting there—rushed out to the street to check the car. Brother in law opened the door and I opened the hood. 'Oh my god, boy do you know what you got here? If you ever want to get rid of it, you let me know and I'll buy it now or any time you want.' Because it had a lace paint job like they did in the early 60s and all. Still does, last time I saw it. I was going to try to find all the parts for that, parts were extremely difficult to find and expensive. Brother in law had this 69 429 and he called me up to give me some information on an engine he knows about, He said he was going sell his, so I said 'Wait a minute, how much you want?' So I ended up buying his, selling the 70."

And after doing 3 cars, along the way they decided they wanted a convertible, bought a 73 convertible and redid that. Had a whole lot of extra parts left over, stuff that he'd bought and didn't need, pieces that people had asked him to pick up if he went to Carlisle or Charlotte: "if you see this pick it up."

"Well you can get into having a lot of extra parts when you do that, I learned the hard way. Then started fooling with buying and selling a few parts, then still kept fooling with the Mustangs, my own cars."



If you had all the money and access to parts, what would you build? "Probably a 32 Ford or 40 Coupe. Always like them. And a 50 Mercury too, had several too." They are his favorite. All Ford powered. He started with Flatheads. That's what got him in trouble, he went to the bank with Billie's blessing and borrowed 300 to build engine and blew it to pieces. "My car is broke, I'm broke and I've got to make payments on the thing. Billie was pregnant with Terry and I had to borrow 350 to get Billie out of the hospital at Richmond Memorial. I had to stop at the bank on the way to get her."

What's in your garage now? 1967 GT Fastback; 1969 BOSS 429; 1970 BOSS 302; 1971 BOSS 351; 1973 Convertible; 1993 GT convertible; 2003 Mach I; 1969 Ranchero; 2001 Lightning; 2002 Lightning; 2007 F350.

"We gave 64 Mercury to our daughter and her husband. And we sold a 69 Fairlane Cobra 428, 4 speed car with trunk mounted battery, which most people said didn't come in a Fairlane. I said yes it did, can show you in the parts book. We had it stored since 90."

"Friend in FL started talking about it, runs a shop down there." Bill said "I'll get it out of the bldg but I have friend that wants to look at it first here in Richmond." He did but it was too much money, he wanted something that was running and that one had been sitting since '90. So the friend in FL came with a trailer.

"Normally I don't sell anything, keep em but I'd rather have the family have it. People say you got a BOSS at home, they say that's a lot of money. Money got nothing to do with it. I don't believe in buying a car for the money. I buy it because I want it. Want that style car, something like that. That's why I've kept all the Mustangs. And the Mercury, I'd take to pieces and crush it before I'd sell it. I bought this car new; I wasn't going to worry about it." Billie said she learned to drive the Mercury, 4 speed. She taught her boys to drive it, he wouldn't let their daughter drive it, she was so little and it was a pretty big sized car. But that was the car Billie hauled the kids to Little League in it. You could move a house in that trunk of those cars. She loved that car.

Being as Terry never got to drive it, Billy got to thinking about it, and asked Billie what she thought of giving it to she and Donny, lock stock and barrel, still had the original title. "All those years we'd bought parts for it. If you find parts for a 64 Mercury, you'd better buy them as you'll never see them anymore. Found a whole dashboard in Carlisle, gauges and everything. Cars, I've enjoyed them all my life, I didn't make a living with them, but working on airplanes."

In your opinion, what's the strangest build you've ever seen? "Used to go to a lot of shows, like the Asphalt Angels have here, in DC, and other places. 2 and 4 engine cars were kind of wild but questioned how they were built. Did they actually run? Know of one car around here didn't have anything inside the engine. If you are going to have a show car then it

doesn't have to run. A lot of Mustangs are for show, get pushed on and off trailers."

"I remember one time a guy had bands around his tires to cover the tread so his tires would never touch the ground. I carried my 429 to Ohio to be painted. I put 4 old wheels that are dry rotted on them, it really looks like the devil with these wheels on it but there's 4 new old stock Magnum 500s tires mounted in that other building covered up with a blanket, I wasn't going to have those on there while it's painted.

As a charter member and one of the club's ambassadors, what do vou want the public to **know about the club?** "Probably the things that money has been donated for different causes and about the Road trash pick up. Know that car people do some good. Because when I came along, belonging to a car club that wasn't the best thing to tell anybody years and years ago. They'd think you were a hoodlum." Billie's mother was pretty sure he was. "I might have been but it was short lived." Billie's daddy nicknamed him Al Capone. "A lot of people don't think about that are not into cars, not just our club but all car clubs. They generally have some charity that they contribute to and the club is not in it to make money, you have to have to have enough to keep going and to allow for extra expenses, but I don't have any problem with what we've donated and there's always somebody that comes up with a good cause. Billie's been bowling 45 years in a bowling league and they used to keep a family to give to at Christmas time, now they give to the Food Bank every year. And they have 80 women in the league and they donate very well."

If you could go back to the founding year, knowing all you know now, what message would you deliver to the charter members? "We did a damn good job of getting it started. Always had a good club, it's something to be proud of. Don't participate like we used to in the early years, but thoroughly

enjoyed it and we were active in the early years--all thru the 90s. After that, we started getting old; I'll be 75 in May. Woke up and wondered what happened?

I was at the Doctor's office, talking to the secretary and she come to find out that we'd just come back from Carlisle. She said 'Oh I went to Carlisle once, my husband was into Corvettes. And he was going to buy a car but I told him you buy that car, I'm going home and I'm not going to be there when you get home.' He bought the car and she came home by herself and divorced him."

Bill thought he'd die laughing. "Billie has been beside me through all these years, and we've been together 56 yrs in July. Fooling with cars is not all bad. If she wasn't interested, that might be a different ball game. I've seen those."

Hot Wheels or Match Box cars? "We've bought and liked both." They are into the toys but backed off in later years as they ran out of room. Article by Militza Simic Photos by Rusty Wiseman

Montpelier Cruise!

The first cruise for 2010 is planned for Sunday, May 2, 2010.

Here's the tentative schedule:

Meet in west end 9:30 a.m.
Just west of the Broad St./64
Interchange, there is a Home Depot on the right. We will leave at 10a.m.

Arrive at Montpelier approx 11 a.m. Montpelier will have a place for all of the Mustangs to park together.

11:15 a.m. - 15 min. presentation film at visitor's center.

11:30 a.m. - 12:45 p.m. guided tour for groups of 20.

12:45 p.m. - 2:30 p.m. Tour grounds on your own.

2:45-3:00 p.m. meet at parking area to go to restaurant.

3:00 – lunch/dinner at Country Cookin' Restaurant.

We will cruise to Montpelier, President James Madison's home from 1797 to 1812, located in the rolling Piedmont hills of Virginia northeast of Charlottesville. You can also take advantage of the Montpelier Wine Festival, which will be held on the grounds of Montpelier on the same day. The home has been through a \$25 million architectural restoration, which was completed Sept. 27, 2008 by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. The estate has been restored to look as it did when James and Dolley Madison lived there. Check out Montpelier's web site: http://www.montpelier.org/

Admission Fees: Admission to Montpelier includes a guided tour of the Madison home; admission to the 2,650-acre gardens and grounds; seasonal and themed tours; the Gilmore Cabin: A Freedman's Farm; the Visitor Center and William Du Pont Gallery; Education Center; Museum Shop; Landmark Forest; Madison Family Cemetery; Slave Cemetery; active archaeological digs; and the Annie Du Pont Formal Garden. Admission also includes an audio guide that allows visitors to take a self-guided tour of the grounds.

JACK ROUSH CELEBRATES WIN 400 March 7. 2010

Hampton, Ga. — Jack Roush Sr. celebrated a racing milestone yesterday at Homestead-Miami Speedway when his son, Jack Roush Jr., and co-driver Billy Johnson won the Homestead 200 (Grand Sport Class) at Homestead-Miami Speedway. The win marked the 400th all-time victory for Roush Sr. in road racing and NASCAR combined.

The race, which was part of the Continental Tire Sports Car Challenge Series, featured Roush Jr. starting from the 34th position and driving his Mustang GT all the way through the field until he finally got the lead on lap 35 of the 91-lap event.

Roush Sr. spoke about his feelings regarding that memorable victory while Jamie Allison, director, Ford Racing North America Motorsports, also provided some comments after witnessing yesterday's race. Roush Sr. was recently named recipient of the 2010 Robert E. Petersen Lifetime Achievement Award for his contribution to hot rodding.

JACK ROUSH SR., OWNER, ROUSH FENWAY RACING; JACK HAD TO START FROM THE BACK AND DROVE IT ALL THE WAY THROUGH THE FIELD. WHAT WERE YOUR THOUGHTS WATCHING THAT? "It was unfortunate in the race yesterday that the pole qualifying time Jack earned was disqualified based on an infraction the sanctioning body said that he had for his brake duct placement, so they removed the brake ducts that were in question and he had to start in the back.

"There were two or three other cars that had to start in the back as well, but without pit stops he went to 12th or 13th under green, and when he turned the car over to Billy Johnson around the midway point, he was in first place. Billy was able to maintain that, and one of the reasons was a decision to only make one stop.

"The fuel system of the Ford Mustang was able to get great fuel economy that allowed them to make one stop instead of two, so they raced up front the last half of the race. It was a timed race of two hours and 30 minutes, and when the last caution occurred within 15 minutes of the end, he was able to stretch his lead out in the closing laps and they were able to finish first. That's the second time this driver combination has won."

WHAT WAS YOUR REACTION? "When Jack decided he wanted to road race three years ago, I was not sure that's what we needed to be doing. He was already more than 30 years old and past the time when a lot of drivers would get started. He was building his family and building his career at Roush Industries, and I wasn't sure that's

what he ought to be doing, but he seemed to be committed to it, as my daughter is, and she works for the company as well, in addition to drag racing.

"So, I forwarded him the consideration of providing some sponsorship and, initially, he found Rehagen Racing, a Michigan team that races Ford Mustangs, and he purchased a seat with that team for a year-and-a-half, and then last year made the deal with Mike Canny of Horsepower Ranch out of Virginia.

"I thought [this] was going to be my salvation of not having to put forward another race team for my son, but then Mike Canny decided in February of 2009 that he wouldn't race anymore. Jack raced the equipment that Canny had, exclusive of the car which he owned, but he used Canny's trailer and his equipment for the balance of 2009 and then we fitted him up with his own stuff. We recommitted Roush Racing, which was in a dormant state, to go road racing with Jack and Susan, and he won in his second race."

WHAT DO YOU THINK ABOUT 400 WINS? "It makes me feel old.

"It was ironic that my son was there. I know that when he was about three weeks old I had a serious drag racing wreck in my pro stock car. I had purchased a gasoline-power, fourcycle Briggs and Stratton ieep for Jack to ride around in. He was three or four weeks old, and I got home with my concussion after spending a week in the hospital. My wife, Pauline, stayed with the three children at home-Susan, Patricia and young Jack—and this jeep was parked on the front porch. She wouldn't let it in the house and when I got home she asked me, 'What is that all about?' And I said, 'Well, the boy needed to have his first race car and I figured I couldn't get started too soon.' But he closed the deal yesterday and got the 400th victory for our organization and I'm very proud of him."

YOU'VE HAD A LOT OF GREAT DRIVERS THROUGH THE YEARS TO GET YOU TO THIS POINT. CAN YOU TALK ABOUT THAT? "We've been very successful and had the opportunity to race in the NASCAR Camping World Truck Series, the Nationwide Series and the Sprint Cup Series, so we've had a great opportunity to be involved with a lot of great drivers over more than three decades since we started counting the wins.

"It's been amazing and quite a ride. To look back and think about all the great drivers who have been in these cars, and what it's meant to Roush Racing and Roush Fenway and to their careers, it's just incredible. It makes me feel old."

JAMIE ALLISON, DIRECTOR, FORD NORTH AMERICA MOTORSPORTS WHAT DOES IT MEAN FOR JACK TO WIN NO. 400? "Being right there in the moment when Jack, a lifelong part of Ford Motor Company, notched his 400th win was special. Having his son a part of that moment and me personally representing Ford and watching the Mustang cross that finish line to deliver it was great. Afterwards I went up to Jack and Jack Jr. and gave them a big Ford hug."

WHAT DOES JACK MEAN TO FORD RACING? "He is a part of the Ford family. He started his career at Ford, raced a Ford, built Fords and campaigned Fords from Trans-Am to NASCAR.

"He is the spirit of Ford and Ford Racing. Through him, legions of fans follow Ford. All of the success we have enjoyed is built on the arms and backs of people who work at Roush. We are so thrilled for him to celebrate a very monumental victory and it is even more special that Jack Jr. was involved. I really know Jack Jr. very well and he is a chip off the old block."

WHAT WAS IT LIKE WATCHING HIM COME FROM BEHIND TO WIN? "I was there about four years ago when Jack Jr. got into Grand Am and was down at VIR in a rainy and cold overnight race. Yesterday at the race in Miami, he started last and had to work through the field to deliver the car in first place to his co-driver, who carried it forward. Great driving, great team, great Mustang and it couldn't

have happened to a more deserving driver."

News From The Car Club Council

Free advice – if you are a car hobbyist you need to be proactive and you need to be assertive about your rights. I've been running an article the last couple of months asking if anyone has had trouble with getting a title after purchasing a vehicle from a nontitle state. I've spoken to several people who have contacted me. The best advice I can give a car hobbyist going to DMV for a transaction is know the law and don't let a DMV customer service clerk get you to make an error. Be assertive enough that if you are not getting what you expect to walk out and try another DMV. Different DMV customer service centers handle transactions differently. That's a fact. An example is how they handle original titles for antique vehicles. Some centers will stamp VOID on the title and hand it back to you. Others will make a copy and give you that. And others unfortunately will say they can't do that, take that valuable original title and shred it. Have the guts to walk out and go to another one!

The same advice applies to the zoning police. Due to the "great recession" localities are strapped for cash. Many localities are sending out employees to search for zoning and building violations. They usually start in blue collar subdivisions and look for any new construction (without a building permit), homes in need of repair, grass not cut and of course that old car or truck without current license plates or inspection sticker. You are allowed to keep vehicles as long as they are stored properly and out of sight from the road. This means you

should keep any parts or project vehicles that are not registered for use behind buildings, trees, etc. They should not be able to be seen from the road in front of your home. A little known fact is that localities cannot ticket you for any violation that cannot be seen from the road. They do not have the right to go on your property to perform a hunting expedition for zoning violations. They need a search warrant to do that.

Be firm when dealing with the zoning police. Know your local ordinances for your city or county. Once I had an employee of the zoning department send me - in writing - 24 hours notice to move a truck that did not have license plates. I called and was told the truck had been there for a couple of weeks and since it was in violation that long he was giving me a "break" by letting me have an additional 24 hours. The county ordinance states that the period given to move the vehicle begins AFTER the owner has been notified in writing. They have to info you properly.

The economy may be getting better - the Dow is up, gas prices are up and scrap prices are up. I recently went to a local scrap metal recycler and noticed that many older cars and trucks are once again being turned in for cash. I saw a couple of mid-60s short bed Chevy trucks - one looked pretty good, a 62 Chevy II station wagon and even a 67 Mustang all waiting for the crusher. You may have noticed all the ads for cash for old vehicles. Be aware that the people running the ads are going to sell the entire vehicle or part it out for as much as possible and then scrap the rest. They are looking to make money and that is fine. If you do have an older car or truck you should first try to sell to a hobbyist who can use it for parts or even his or her next project. Ebay Motors has dropped their selling fee for vehicles that sell for less than \$2000. The popular CraigsList has no fee to run an ad to sell a car or truck. Go ahead and post that old car or truck online. You'd be surprised at how far someone will drive to purchase a

parts vehicle to complete his or her project. And you'd be helping a fellow car hobbyist.
