Mustang Times Article "Four for the Road" on cover, page 3 and pages 18-24 of March 2025 issue

As most of you know, I am an avid Ford fan, specifically with Mustangs and Cobras.

Taking advantage of the beautiful fall weather and colors of the trees on my property, I paid Casey Cole, a professional photographer to take over 400 pictures of the cars over a two-hour period on a Sunday morning in October 2024. Once I had the digital photographs in early December 2024, I contacted Donald Farr, editor of *Mustang Times* magazine.

Donald stated, "Perfect timing. It has been a while that we focused on a car collection. It should make the March 2025 issue."

As a long-time member of The Mustang Club of America (MCA) and subscriber to the *Mustang Times* and *Mustang Monthly* magazines since the 1980s, I knew how to draft an article worthy of printing. I submitted the text of the article, a link to the 400 digital photographs of the cars, and several additional historical pictures with my brothers to Donald. He and his team worked their magic in its final form. The magazine was released today in both print and digital form.

I offer the attached digital copy of the magazine for your enjoyment. As I have said since day one of owning the 1967 and 1971 cars, I will NEVER, EVER sell them. I have too many memories of their construction with my late brother Charles. I know he is smiling up above. Charles was undoubtedly the smartest person I have ever known. I have always thought God blessed me with a great memory. However, Charles was nearly photographic in that he could remember anything. In fact, he remembered so many details of the cars that he worked on it shocked the owners.

Charles was a well-educated engineer with a BS in Aeronautical Engineering from The Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in 1974 and a MS in Civil & Structural Engineering from The University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA) in 1976.

Charles created two businesses: Bruno Engineering providing Civil and Structural consulting and Charlie's Mustangs for high performance improvements primarily in the "Fox Body" and older Mustangs.

Charles's first Mustang projects were my brother Cyril's 1967 Coupe and my 1971 Mach 1. We learned a lot working together on these cars as we experimented with so many improvements in the entire car, not just the engine. The article contained a picture of us dropping a balanced and blueprinted motor into Cyril's 1967 Coupe. As Charles used to say, "Let's pull some wrenches and improve this beast." I offer the picture below of Charles

working on his 1974 Ford Van that he received new as a graduation gift from our parents. He removed the original 302 V8 and replaced it with a 351 Windsor.



Prior to Charles purchasing a new Ford Ranger pickup and a new Ford F350 pickup, we created a parts car using Cyril's junker of a 1978 Dodge Colt that we affectionally called "The Jolt." As Charles would often say, "It is your destiny." Using a cutting torch, crowbar, hammer, and other tools we proceeded to cut off the roof and convert the two-door coupe into a pickup truck. We boxed in the rear using ¾" plywood and structural braces. I offer the picture of me posing with the car prior to the transformation. We had the most fun with that "1917 Pace Car" chasing parts all over the SF Bay Area. We also removed the front fenders to give the car a meaner look.



On what turned out to be the last day of the car's life, I purchased over \$8,000 worth of parts in 1984 for the convertible. After I unloaded the parts into Charles's shop, I called my mother that I was ready to leave for the one-hour drive home. I never made. A prospective buyer was test driving a Chevrolet Monte Carlo with the salesman in the passenger seat. He ran a red light while attempting to make an oncoming left turn and hit me head-on. My head cracked the windshield and knocked me unconscious. After being transported via ambulance, I awakened in a hospital 6 hours later just before midnight. Although the car was totaled, I just wanted the new Sears Diehard battery. However, the wrecking yard crushed the vehicle which yielded me full Kelly Blue Book for the car!

The article included the timeframe of 39 weekends in a 65-week period that Charles and I built the Mach 1. We were excited to finally start the car. The 351 Cleveland

engine ran a bit rough at 2,000 RPM so we called Tim Morgan who balanced, and blue printed the engine. He reminded us that the engine would be "tight" given its 11 to 1 compression ratio and internal clearances. We decided to drive it 50 miles and see if it would improve. It didn't. We returned to the shop and pulled the oil pan to find metal shavings in the oil. We pulled the valve covers to find the source of the metal shavings. We used Ford Boss 351 push rod guide plates that must have not been heat treated. Once the engine reached operating temperature, the guide plates degraded from a perfect circle surrounding the push rod to an oblong shape. The engine had to be removed and once again be balanced and blue printed to repair the damage from the metal shavings flowing in the oil. We were so unhappy we burned our overalls. We reduced the compression ration to 9 to 1 and modified the valves to burn unleaded fuel as it was difficult to find leaded. premium fuel and I was tired of adding octane booster to my gas tank at each fill-up.

Finally, after another month of delay, the engine was rejuvenated. We dropped it in and took it to the streets once again. This time however, the car had so much torque that it cracked the rear-end housing. Cyril took the car to a high-performance shop in Pomona, CA for a new Ford 9-inch nodular case with a Detroit Locker, positraction and 3.50 gears.

As for the convertible, Charles improved the stiffness of the chassis by welding in "sub-frame connectors" that ran front to back. His welds were strong and beautiful as we used to say. While at a car show, a person showed interest in the car as he said to me, "Wow, you have sub-frame connectors on your convertible. Let me look underneath." We both got on our backs to view them in detail. While on the ground we both noticed the car moved. Why? What caused it to move? He got up quicker than me to find his girlfriend sitting on my front fender wearing only a bikini, high heels, sunglasses and hat. He yelled out, "Get you fat ass off his car." She yelled back, "No one is looking at me!" The man turned to me to apologize when I said. "Technically, it's not that fat." He replied, "I like you man - and your car too!" As these stories tell, working on cars can be "fun" as we used to say. One final story was the time I had drained the oil from the engine. I carried the 8-quarts of used oil down the ramp of Charlie's shop to dump in the recycling bin. The ramp was wet and slippery from the pigeon droppings, and I slipped. The entire pan of 8 quarts of oil poured on me from the chest down. Yuck. All I could do was laugh and tell Charles I would return the next week with my shotgun and shoot those damn pigeons. I did. We shared shooting about 20 of the birds before they finally flew away from under the roof. They never returned.

Honestly, Cyril was and is the best driver. I witnessed several times his ability to smoke any car that attempted to "race" him on the street. The best was a Porsche 911 on a two-lane freeway onramp from a standing start. The driver had on racing gloves. We had Cyril's car fully

loaded with Christmas gifts and he still smoked the guy. (I did the same thing with a 1970 Chevelle SS 396 on the freeway when I had the wife's approval to do so. That's another story.)

I hope you enjoyed my reminiscing of the good ole' days of turning wrenches with my brothers!

Our annual Regional Club update material was received at Headquarters, however, there were 2 problems that were not accepted by the committee which needed to be corrected, and notification was sent to resolve the problems. I will notify the committee when the problems are corrected for the committee to finish the review for acceptance of CVMC updated material.

As of the MCA January 2025 Board of Directors meeting in Florida, the Helene Relief Challenge to MCA chartered clubs had *DONATED* over \$42,000.00. The National Board voted to make a \$5,000.00 donation to Samaritan's Purse which raised it to \$47,000.00 with donations still coming in. Collectively the MCA chartered clubs have passed \$50,000.00 to help the communities in the flooded areas. CVMC's \$2,665.00 contribution went to the United Way of Southwest Virginia Regional Disaster Relief Fund.
